And that is the lack of funds for most Social Services. One guess speaker was Jagmeet Singh. If you are not aware– the NDP Party is supported by Unions all across Canada.

I'd like to share a bit of brief history for what is now the NDP. In 1956 most of Canada's labour groups united in the <u>Canadian Labour Congress</u>, which in August 1961 formed the New Democratic Party, incorporating the CCF but welding a stronger working arrangement with <u>organized labour</u>. (The <u>provincial</u> party in <u>Saskatchewan</u> retained the CCF name until 1967.) The NDP was able to form governments in Saskatchewan, <u>Manitoba</u>, and <u>British Columbia</u> intermittently from the 1940s to the 1990s, in <u>Yukon</u> from the 1980s, and in <u>Ontario</u>, Canada's largest and wealthiest province, in the 1990s. At the national level, however, it enjoyed only scattered success, its support peaking in the 1988 election, when it won 43 seats in the <u>House of Commons</u>.

Family Meals Made Easy-

Shrimp Alfredo





Nutrition Facts: 1 cup: 788 calories, 51g fat (31g saturated fat), 317mg cholesterol, 573mg sodi-

um, 45g carbohydrate (4g sugars, 2g fiber), 38g protein.

Ingredients

- 8 ounces uncooked fettuccine
- 1/4 cup butter, cubed
- 1-1/2 cups heavy whipping cream
- 1 pound cooked medium shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh parsley

Lemon wedges, optional

Directions

Cook fettuccine according to package directions. Meanwhile, in a large saucepan or skillet, melt the butter over medium heat. Stir in cream. Bring to a gentle boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 3 minutes, stirring constantly.

Add the shrimp, cheese, garlic and pepper; cook and stir until heated through. Drain fettuccine; toss with shrimp mixture. Sprinkle with parsley; if desired, top with additional Parmesan cheese and serve with lemon wedges.
